"Because Timothy had genuine faith, Paul urged him to set it ablaze. The expression "fan into flame" describes the act of rekindling the embers of a dying fire. The command does not imply that Timothy had let his spiritual flame go out. It is an appeal for a continual, vigorous use of his spiritual gifts.

Rekindling his gifts would involve fervent prayer, obedience to God's Word, and demonstration of an active faith."
